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### GOD-FOCUSED PRAYER

I want my prayers to be more Godcentered. If you stop and notice your own praying, does it focus mostly on God and praise to Him? Or like me, are you going on and on about yourself and your requests? Take a look at Psalm 86. Here the psalmist is in the midst of a great trial, fearing for his life. But his concentration is decidedly upon the Lord. By my count, David refers directly to God 48 times in the 17 verses of this prayer-psalm. Yes, he mentions his needs, but his soul is lifted up to God (v. 4). He knows he's in physical danger, yet he pours out

worship for God's mercy, grace, faithfulness, forgiveness, and steadfast love.


Worrisome thoughts can run this way and that in our heads. What we should do is herd all those needs and requests to God. We can leave our petitions with the Lord, saying with the psalmist, "For thou art great, and doest wondrous things: thou art God alone" (v. 10). We all tend to go off in many different directions. So David prays, "unite my heart to fear thy name" (v. 11). Unite my heart. Make me whole-hearted toward You, Lord. Single-minded to reverence You in love. Charles Spurgeon says, "Our minds are apt to be divided between a variety of objects, like trickling streamlets which waste their force in a hundred [little channels]; our great desire should be to have all our life floods poured into one channel and to have that channel directed towards the Lord alone." Good stuff! May God be the center of our lives, and the center of our prayers.

### **SEEING PAUL'S GOD**

For the entire first chapter of Colossians Paul has been captivated with Christ. But, Paul cannot just think about Christ. His magnificence and beauty causes him to desire to proclaim Christ, no matter the cost. This is a sightseeing trip that has life transforming effects. Christ does this!

Paul rejoices he is able to suffer for the Body of Christ. He rejoices that he is able to minister (serve; be a servant) for the Body of Christ. Paul is so overcome by the opportunity to tell of the astounding treasure he had found: Christ.

As you read this chapter of Colossians I hope you have been blessed with a

renewed appreciation for and enthusiasm about Jesus Christ. But verses 26-27 force us to look up again. Paul has tried to stretch his language and use any word possible to help us understand the wonderful magnificence in Christ. The object of this chapter was Jesus Christ, God. However, when words no longer work Paul shows us himself. He shows us a life overtaken by the majesty he has tried to describe. If the words did not work, consider instead the immense impact Christ has had on Paul. This hard to be described but now understood mystery is everything. Paul's words were not totally sufficient and my words also fail. But consider these words...

What does "riches" mean? What feeling or image does it bring to your mind? What does "glory" mean? Is it the same as 'mediocre' or 'boring?' What does the noun "hope" mean? Do you have the hope described here?

# GOD ALWAYS

Try to imagine how many times you have prayed in your life. Now, try to imagine only being allowed to pray 20 or 30 times ever! God doesn't set a limit for how many times we can pray; He wants us to come to Him whenever we want. It is good to have a schedule when it comes to praying or reading your Bible, but many times people just end up reading or praying so they can get it out of the way instead of meditating on it.

You might notice that in Psalm 5, in every verse, David is praying to God.

**KEY VERSE:** Psalm 5:1 Give ear to my words, O Lord, consider my meditation.

THOUGHT TO GLOW: We can come to God whenever we want, but not out of selfishness.

In David's prayer, he is acknowledging what God says He will do not only to the wicked but also how He will love and protect His children.

Now some people might take this the wrong way thinking whenever they pray, God will do what they want Him to do. You might think that if God does not answer, He is not listening, but God always listens. This is why David says in verse 7, he will "come into thy house" and worship God.

A couple of weeks ago I prayed to God for Him to use me for His glory. A couple days later, I was asked if I wanted to write a Glow devotion. At first, I didn't think much about the connection, but I slowly realized this was God's answer to my prayer. God does listen, and He does answer your prayers just not always in the ways you thought He would. God is loving, and He will provide for His children. In the meantime, trust Him and be patient.

in my uncle's garage for about 4 years. It belonged to me, but I did not "have" it yet. Although it was mine, my uncle had the control (authority) over the furniture.

Before we trust Christ, "when we were children," we were in bondage to the law. It was our authority, harshly binding us and furiously teaching us (3:23-24). This isn't necessarily a bad thing. In fact, the law is given to us by God for a very good reason—to show us our need of Christ!

This text forces us to ask a very personal and hard question. You may have to think this through for a while. "Is your life characterized by a sense of bondage?" I'm not talking about living at home, or going to school! I am talking about the condition of your heart. Do you feel like no matter what, you never measure up? Maybe you feel that no matter how hard you try you are a spiritual failure. Maybe you simply feel like you can never do enough right. Maybe you're still in bondage to the law.

### THE GOOD NEWS OF JESUS CHRIST

This world is full of pain, frustration, and death. You can try to run away from it; you can even try to distract yourself from it, but all of these things will fail and leave you hurt and hopeless.

**GOD** The Bible is God's story of rescue and it begins with Him. God is perfectly holy and separate from sin (Isaiah 6:3). God made the world perfect and created us to worship and praise Him (Revelation 4:11); but something went terribly wrong.

**MAN** In the Garden of Eden, man rebelled against God, and the consequence was severe (Genesis 3)! A consequence that the earth and mankind would have to endure forever. This explains all the pain and frustration, but what about death? Because God is holy, He cannot tolerate sin. Sin separates us from God (Romans 5:12). Just as the consequence brought death to our physical bodies, it also brought eternal separation from God in Hell (Matthew 25:41 and 46).

**CHRIST** But God, who is rich in mercy and love sent Jesus Christ to rescue us (Luke 19:10)! He did this by taking our place (I Peter 3:18). He died on the cross to take the punishment of our sin. Three days later, He rose from the dead gaining final victory over death and securing eternal life (I Corinthians 15:3-4).

**RESPOND** This rescue cannot be earned. It is actually offensive to God to try to earn it. Salvation is freely given to all who confess their sin (repent) and put all their trust in what Jesus did for them (believe). This is faith! Romans 10:9 tells us, "that if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved."

If you have never placed your faith in Jesus alone to save you, why not do that now? "Dear God, I know that I have sinned against you and deserve Hell. I now receive Jesus Christ who died in my place and rose again, as my Savior. In Jesus name, Amen."

If you trusted Christ as your savior, let others know. Tell your parents, pastor, friend, *or us*!

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
